Note that Yellowstone National Park is at high altitude. Most of the National Park is above 7,500 ft / 2,275 m and the Beartooth Highway ascends to nearly 11,000 ft / 3,353 m, where we

Amiving at night we transfer to our hotel in Jackson Hole. We begin our tour exploring the breath-taking Grand Teton NP, a land of towering peaks, pine forests, sagebrush plain, jewel-like lakes and the meandering Snake River. Birds will include Mountain Chickadee, Yellow-rumped Warbler, Ruby-crowned Kinglet, Mountain Bluebird and Broad-tailed Hummingbird and at nearby Flat Creek we'll see Trumpeter Swan, Cinnamon Teal and smart Yellow-headed Blackbirds.

The historic Mormon Row barns set amongst the sprawling Antelope Flats, will have you reaching for your camera and we'll probably see our first Bison, Pronghom and irresistible Least Chipmunks and Uinta Ground Squirrels. The National Elk Refuge holds Sandhill Crane, Rock Wren, Horned Lark and perhaps our first Coyote. We'll stop at

famous Oxbow Bend beneath lofty Mount Moran looking for River Otters, Moose, Osprey and soaring Bald Eagles and we'll return for an evening along the river looking for crepuscular Beavers. Watching these animals swimming back and forth, tending to their dams and lodges is a tour highlight!

4–6 We travel north along scenic Jackson Lake exploring the wild north section of Grand Teton Park. We'll see White Pelicans, Common Loons and may encounter our first bear! We stay overnight at Flagg Ranch.

Continuing north, steadily climbing through endless lodgepole pine forests, we reach the world's first and most famous National Park - Yellowstone. At Old Faithful and Nomis Basins we are at the centre of the geo-thermal wonders of the Park - an incredible 70% of the world's geysers are here and we'll explore the

bewildering collection of bubbling mud pools, erupting steam jets and multi-coloured pools. Predictable geysers include Castle, Daisy, Riverside, Grand as well as Old Faithful, so expect a fun time geyser-gazing!

From West Yellowstone we'll explore the wildlife rich south section of the National Park, We'll visit the famous Hayden Valley, where the wide open spaces are dotted with herds of Bison and American Elk and we've often seen charismatic Gray Wolf and Grizzly Bear, Flying raptors include Northern Harrier and Red-tailed and Swainson's Hawk and along the nearby Yellowstone River are splendid Harlequin Ducks and American Dippers. We'll also spend time at Pelican Creek and Fishing Bridge in search of River Otter, Beaver and Belted Kingfisher.

Travelling north we drive through the most spectacular country, stopping at Canyon where the river cuts a deep gorge, appropriately named the Grand Canyon of Yellowstone - a stunning landscape of colourful eroded pillars and huge spectacular waterfalls. Climbing over Dunraven Pass and Mt Washburn we'll be on the lookout for endearing Golden-mantled Ground Squirrel, Yellow-bellied Marmot and American Pika, before dropping into the open country of North Yellowstone, a wildlife haven.

From our base at Cooke City we'll need some early morning excursions to the famous Lamar Valley if we want to see magnificent Gray Wolves. Re-introduced in 1995, these superb animals are an integral part of the restored ecosystem and we've had some amazing encounters: packs travelling the valley floor;



chasing Elk and Bison; defending carcasses from Grizzlies. What might we see in America's Serengeti?

On the spectacular Beartooth Highway, listed as one of the most beautiful roads in America, we'll look for specialities of the high country such as Mountain Goat, Bighom Sheep, Golden Eagle and Black Rosy Finch.

We move to Gardiner at the northwest gate of Yellowstone, where Elk graze the lower elevations and the friendly ground squirrels will be on the lookout for the local Prairie Falcons. Nearby, at Mammoth, are the beautiful volcanic travertine terraces and an early morning visit is perfect for photos and birds such as Townsend's Solitaire, Hammond's Flycatcher and Western Tanager, Around the Blacktail Deer Plateau we'll look for Williamson's Sapsucker, Three-toed Woodpecker and MacGillivray's Warbler, along with Gray and Steller's Jay.

Travelling south our route takes in Travelling south out the impressive Yellowstone Lake at 7,700 feet. The lake hosts Barrow's Goldeneye, Bufflehead and Common Loon, as well as River Otter. Reluctantly we leave Yellowstone, crossing the Continental Divide for an overnight at Flagg Ranch.

Our last full day takes us back through Grand Teton NP. We're sure to stop at Jenny Lake and Signal Mountain for a last look at the stunning mountain scenery, before checking in at Jackson Hole for our last night.

Leaving Jackson Hole, we fly home, arriving in the UK on Day 15.
